Portfolio: Your portfolio is a compilation of information you will need to send to any graduate educational programs. It will consist the following items: 1) requirements for the professional school(s) you may consider entering in your state of residence or other states; 2) a resume that includes your current and permanent contact information, education, honors and distinctions, a list of previous and current employment, a list of your extracurricular activities, and references; 3) student-copy of your official transcripts, and 4) a personal statement (700 words max) of why you believe the target vocation fits you as a person and as a professional. This folder will be collected on April 27, 2006 at the beginning of class.
