

Psychology and Counseling Graduate Programs College of Health Sciences Annual Report 2015- 2016

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Curriculum Revisions

For the 2015-2016 academic year, M.A. Counseling credit hours changed from 48 to 66 to prepare for the Texas LPC and MFT Board academic requirements of 60 hours beginning in September 2017.

The new curriculum includes a three-day intensive at the campus in Longview. The course is PSYC 6002 Applied Lab and Treatment Planning, which includes an interview with the graduate psychology and counseling faculty to determine readiness for practicum.

PSYC 6001 Professional Seminar was also added and is taken during the student's last year. This course includes taking the CPCE and submitting a portfolio.

Course Revisions

Based on feedback from students, on-site supervisors, program outcomes, and course evaluations, the graduate counseling faculty revised PSYC 5023 Counseling Skills, PSYC 5043 Psychopathology, and PSYC 5113 Human Sexuality and Sex Therapy. These courses changed from 7 weeks to full semester (15 weeks). The 15 week courses will begin Summer 2016.

Other revisions include changing PSYC 5053 Research Methods from a 7 week course to 15 week course and changing PSYC 5293 Structural Therapy from a 7 week course to a 15 week course.

Overview of the Year

Course Evaluations are conducted at the end of each semester for every course. Students have an opportunity to evaluate both the course and the instructor by utilizing an online evaluation. This evaluation uses a 5-point Likert scale. Students also have an

opportunity to write comments and suggestions about the course and the instructor. This information is used to evaluate the courses and to help determine if revisions are needed.

The evaluations also serve to provide additional training to instructors as needed. For example, five instructors received scores below 4.0. These instructors received feedback and tips to help with improving communication in expressing clear expectations.

Program Outcomes and Student Learning Outcomes are evaluated at the end of each academic year. The university requires each academic area to provide an Institutional Effectiveness (IE) report. This report provides the program outcomes, course alignment, measurement tool, data collection process, target level of performance, results, and modifications. This data is discussed with the graduate faculty of the School of Psychology and Counseling and the Dean of College of Health Sciences. For the first time the SLO was not met for PSYC 5153 Psychopharmacology. Some students are showing difficulty in writing the research paper. Two students failed the assignment because of plagiarism. The modification is to add PSYC 5053 as a prerequisite. The other SLOs were met and no modifications were needed at this time; however, the SLOs will continue to be monitored.

Student Remediation is a means of helping students improve in specific areas. Remediation plans were developed for the students who plagiarized on their research papers. The graduate faculty recognize a deficit in tracking academic dishonesty and are working on ways to improve in this area. A remediation plan was also developed for a student who violated ethical standards at the practicum site.

Student Professionalism is an important component to the students' development as a counselor. The graduate faculty is working on developing better means of consistently assessing professionalism throughout the program. Currently professionalism is assessed during the student interview and in PSYC 6002 Applied Lab and Treatment Planning.
