

# Psychology and Counseling Graduate Programs Annual Report 2016- 2017

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#### **Curriculum Revisions**

PSYC 5063 Theoretical Foundations was replaced with PSYC 5082 Family Systems and Therapies. PSYC 5063 will be offered through the end of 2017.

#### Overview of the Year

**Course Evaluations** are conducted at the end of each semester for every course. Students have an opportunity to evaluate both the course and the instructor by utilizing an online evaluation. This evaluation uses a 5-point Likert scale. Students also have an opportunity to write comments and suggestions about the course and the instructor.

All full time faculty received evaluations over 4.0. Two adjuncts received scores below 4.0, but above 3.5. The results indicated concerns about receiving feedback in a timely manner. This concerned was discussed with the adjuncts. This information is used to evaluate the courses and to help determine if revisions are needed.

Program Outcomes and Student Learning Outcomes are evaluated at the end of each academic year. The university requires each academic area to provide an Institutional Effectiveness (IE) report. This report provides the program outcomes, course alignment, measurement tool, data collection process, target level of performance, results and modifications. This data is discussed with the graduate faculty of the School of Psychology and Counseling and the Dean. Although no modifications were made, the data will continue to be analyzed.

**Student Remediation** is a means of helping students improve in specific areas. A remediation plan was implemented for a student who plagiarized. It was the student's first offense. The graduate faculty continue to discuss ways to better track student performance issues.

Two students were reported by their site supervisors for ethical concerns. One was related to dual relationships and other was related to lack of documentation of client progress. Remediation plans were developed for these students.

**Student Professionalism** is an important component to the students' development as a counselor. The graduate faculty is working on developing better means of consistently assessing professionalism throughout the program. Currently professionalism is assessed during the student interview, in PSYC 6002 Applied Lab and Treatment Planning, and practicum/internships.
